LATEST ROUND OF RV RECALLS IS RELEASED BY NHTSA

The following is the latest round of RV recalls compiled by the National Highway Traffic Administration (NHTSA).

- Forest River Inc. is recalling 1,346 2019-2020 R. Pod travel trailers. The wire for the refrigerator's spark igniter may have been connected to a breaker that permits a current higher than the wire can handle.
- Livin' Lite Recreational Vehicles is recalling 659 2013-2017 Camplite and 2014-2017 Bearcat recreational trailers. One of the exit windows may be blocked by a manual awning arm.
- REV Recreation Group (REV) is recalling 62 2019 Fleetwood Flair and Holiday Rambler Admiral mo-

torhomes. The generator exhaust pipe placement exits the motorhome within the vehicle's departure angle.

 Forest River Inc. is recalling three 2018-2019 Cherokee ACKT39CL and ACKT39RL travel trailers. The Federal Placard may have incorrect axle rating, cargo carrying capacity, and tire/ wheel combination information.

NHTSA ROLLS OUT NEWEST ROUND OF RECALLS FOR RVS

The following is the latest report from the National Highway Traffic Administration (NHTSA) on the latest RV recalls:

- Airstream Inc. (Airstream) is recalling 1,848 2018-2020 International, Sport, Flying Cloud, Classic, Tommy Bahama, Globetrotter, and Nest travel trailers. The forward end of the spare tire carrier may contact the ground while the trailer is moving possibly resulting in the carrier and spare tire separating from the vehicle.
- New England Wheels is recalling 544 2014-2018 Ford Transit and 2014-2019 Ram Promaster 2500 and 3500 vehicles modified to be equipped with Freedman Go-ES fold-away seats. When the back seat cushion is rotated from the stowed position to the upright position, the seat cushion may not remain locked into place when under load, such as in a crash or a sudden stop.
- Forest River Inc. is recalling 100 2019-2020 Coachmen Beyond, Crossfit and Galleria motorhomes equipped with ProAir air conditioning systems powered by a LI3 lithium ion battery system. The wiring for ProAir system may be undersized for the potential load. Additionally, the circuit was not fuse or breaker protected.

GO RVING BIG PART OF TOY STORY 4 HOLLYWOOD PREMIERE

Camped in a prime spot right on the red carpet, the RV industry was well represented earlier this week for the world premiere of "Toy Story 4," the Disney/Pixar movie that features Woody (voiced by Tom Hanks), Buzz Lightyear (Tim Allen) and the

rest of the gang embarking on a road trip in a Class C motorhome.

The Go RVing Coalition has partnered with Disney/Pixar for the movie, officials said, which among other marketing opportunities included having a specially outfitted Winnebago Navion on the red carpet for the movie's star-studded premiere at the El Capitan Movie Theater on Hollywood Boulevard in Hollywood.

"The premiere was wonderful, and they did it up in true Toy Story fashion. In the movie, the RV park is next to a carnival so the movie lot and the after-party were all in decked out in a carnival theme," said Go RVing Coalition Vice President of Communications Karen Redfern.

"And the entire movie was fantastic," she continued. "The RV is literally part of the movie from beginning to end. It really becomes the set for the entire story. It's referred to as an RV throughout. Obviously, we partnered up with one of the top family-friendly businesses in the world. Disney is all top-notch quality. We couldn't ask for better partners from that standpoint. It will be fantastic family entertainment with this movie, and everything about the content of the movie and the use of the RV was just spot on."



Redfern was joined at the premiere by Courtney Bias and Dana DelVecchio from Go RVing, RV Industry Association (RVIA) Chairman Garry Enyart of Cummins Inc., RVIA Interim President and Senior Vice President of Government Affairs and General Counsel Craig Kirby, Go RVing Co-Chair and Airstream Inc. President and CEO Bob Wheeler, Forest River Inc. Director of Quality Assurance, Codes & Standard Leo Akins, and Chad Reece and Sam Jefson from Winnebago Industries.

From a Go RVing standpoint, Redfern said the premiere was "fantastic." The Go RVing logo was part of the backdrop of the red carpet, so it was highly visible as the stars were being interviewed by various media outlets. The mo-

torhome was also a hit, she added.

"We went with a small Type C motorhome, which is just like what Bonnie and her family have in the movie," she said. "And then the Disney artists, they did some vinyl clings that went up beside of it, too, along with the big Toy Story 4 logo. It had all the characters on the side, so it made it a great photo opportunity point for all of the guests, as well as a good number of the celebrities that were in attendance stopped and did photos.

"Tim Allen not only stopped for a photo, but he opened the door up, went inside and then made a grand dramatic entrance back out waving to everyone and gave everyone a big thumbs up as he came out the door of the RV. So he really had fun with the RV there on the red carpet," she added.

As one might imagine with a Hollywood movie premiere, Redfern confirmed the scene itself was "quite a spectacle," mentioning all the paparazzi in particular.

"Oh my gosh, yes. It was a once in a lifetime opportunity. I didn't ever see myself ever being invited to a Hollywood premiere," she said. "Of course, they had the barrier fences along the front of the theater here on Hollywood Boulevard, so when people traveled down Hollywood Boulevard, as the celebrities were arriving and everyone was going into the theater, people are literally hanging out of the open windows of their cars with their cell phones, trying to capture a photo. And people were lined up on the opposite side of the street seeing if they could get a glimpse of the celebrities as they came through.

"So, to be there and be part of it and just to be able to stand there on the red carpet and watch every person go past — because we were allowed to stay there and take some photos of the celebrities as they stopped at the RV — and just to be able to be part of it, it was so exciting. Absolutely."

Go RVing even had an influence on the development of the movie, she pointed out. At one point, Redfern was shown a clip of the movie. The clip showed Bonnie (Madeleine McGraw) and her family driving in the RV, but they were not seated or wearing safety belts. Redfern delicately brought this to the animators' attention, and she was pleased to see everyone seated and wearing safety belts in the movie's premiere.

"At the time, I said to them, 'I realize that I'm here to potentially be a marketing partner and not a film critic.' But they said, 'No, we're definitely looking for the input.' As they said, they want to make sure that if a

family is going to watch this movie and be inspired to take an RV road trip like Bonnie and her family, that they're going to be doing it properly. So that's when I said, 'There is one scene that I know would make us cringe.' And that was changed in the movie," Redfern explained.

"It was impressive to us that an entertainment company who was looking for a marketing partner would really stop and take stock in what we were saying and say, 'No, we want to make sure that this is portrayed accurately and safely and properly.' That just impressed me with even more so with the integrity of the kind of company that Disney is. And so that just cemented even more in our minds that we were really partnering up with a company that had a lot of great integrity and values that align with what we want in our industry as well," she added.

STATESVILLE DENIES CHANGE TO GANDER FLAG ORDINANCE

The Statesville, N.C., City Council voted against changes to a flag ordinance Monday (June 17) night as the debate over a giant American flag at Gander RV on I-77 continues.

WBTV reported that the proposed change would have allowed a 40-by-80-foot flag to fly in a highway business zone. Monday's vote means the Gander RV flag remains out of compliance. The City's ordinance does permit a 25-by-40-foot flag.

No one spoke at the public hearing, but each council member commented on the issue before voting.

The vote was 5-3 against the motion to amend the ordinance. Voting in favor of the motion were C.O. Johnson, John Staford and Steve Johnson. Voting against the motion were William Morgan, Roy West, Doris Allison, Keith Williams and Michael Johnson.

The vote does not affect the injunction filed against Gander RV back in May which asks the court to order Gander RV to comply with the ordinance and pay a \$50 per day fine.

The owner of Gander RV and reality television star Marcus Lemonis reacted to the vote Monday

night when asked what he thought about the news.

"Unbelievable, I'm stunned," Lemonis said. "When they are faced by people holding them accountable they say the right things, then when they are there to vote and do the right thing they do the wrong thing."

LEMONIS TO N.C. CITY: OUR FLAG WILL NOT COME DOWN

North Carolina city has filed a lawsuit against a business for allegedly violating a city ordinance by flying an American flag that is significantly larger than what the city permits.

But the business isn't backing down — even a court order won't compel Marcus Lemonis, chairman and CEO of Camping World, to remove the massive flag, he told USA TODAY on Wednesday.



"The flag isn't coming down. It's the only thing I know for certain," Lemonis said. "I know I'm going to die. I know I'm going to pay taxes. And I know I'm not taking the flag down."

A release from Statesville, N.C., says recreational vehicle retailer Gander RV has been flying a 3,200-square-foot flag at its Statesville location for more than six months. The company had previously obtained a permit for a 1,000-square-foot flag, which complied with the city's ordinance.

The city says it has repeatedly asked Gander RV to replace the flag with one that is a permitted size. The release says the city is seeking a fine of \$50 for every day the flag has been displayed since an October 2018 notice.

THE TRUTH BEHIND 6 COMMON RV MYTHS & MISCONCEPTIONS

Is RVing only for retired people? Is RVing limited to crowded parks? Learn the truth behind these and other common RV myths

Spend any amount of time researching information about RVing and you're bound to run into some common RV myths and misconceptions. For new RV owners, or those interested in pursuing an RV lifestyle, this can be problematic. These myths often lead people to make decisions based on information that simply isn't accurate.

To sort it all out and separate myth from fact, here are six widely-believed RV myths regarding the RV lifestyle and the truth behind them.

RV Myth #1: The best type of RV is a Class A/Van/Travel Trailer/Fifth Wheel.



Everyone has an opinion regarding the best type of RV. Some people wouldn't dream of traveling in

anything other than a <u>fully outfitted motorhome</u> with 4 slides, a washer/dryer combo, and a bedroom the size of a small apartment. While others turn up their noses at any RV that takes up more than a regular size parking space.

Truth: The best RV is the one that fits your needs.

There is no single RV type that qualifies as "the best." RV choice is personal and depends on factors such as family size, where and how often you plan to use it, whether you already have a truck for towing, how confident you feel <u>making repairs</u>, and many more considerations.

If you're in the market for an RV, don't simply go out and buy a fifth wheel because your uncle said it was the best. Instead, talk to people with different

types of RVs or maybe even rent a few to try them out. In the end, the best type of RV will be the one that fits your unique needs.

RV Myth #2: RV travel is only for older, retired people.

There was once a time when the typical RVer was a retired couple spending their golden years traveling around the country. This couple most certainly does exist—spend any time at an RV park in Florida and you will meet lots of them—but they are far from the only type of RVer.

Truth: RVs are suitable for people and families of all ages.

These days, most campgrounds contain a mix of families, retired couples, solo travelers, and an increasing number of younger working age people. People of all ages are turning to RVs for



travel and full-time living. There is no age threshold you must cross to call yourself an RVer!

RV Myth #3: RVing is expensive (or cheap).

The most common RV myth is about how much it costs to RV. Depending on who you are talking to, the prevailing view is that it's either really expensive or really cheap. Which side of the coin your conviction lies on is directly related to the decisions you make regarding travel style and RV choice.

Truth: Buying, traveling, or living in an RV are all as expensive or as cheap as you make it.

One of the best things about RV travel is how versatile it is. Unlike airfare, hotels, and rental cars, the range of cost associated with RVing is vast. Can RVing be expensive? Of course, if you make it expensive. You can buy a fancy new RV with a big price tag, drive a lot which means spending tons on gas, and stay at expensive resort style RV parks.

On the flip side, if you want to save some bucks, you can buy a modest used RV that needs some TLC, limit your driving time, and seek out less expensive camping options or even places to stay for <u>free on public land</u>. Most RVers fall somewhere in between these two extremes. Which is why depending on the

choices you make, RVing can be considered neither expensive nor cheap.

RV Myth #4: Taking an RV trip means driving all the time.

The logic goes that an RV is a vehicle, therefore, RV travel must involve a lot of driving. And sometimes it does. A road trip from one side of the country to another is going to necessitate a bit of time behind the wheel. Of course, how much time you spend on the road is all about how you plan your trip.

Truth: RV travel allows you to slow down and enjoy the journey.

Taking a road trip in a car and taking a road trip in an RV are two very different experiences. Car travel usually means putting in as many miles as possible in an effort to get where you're going. RV travel can be similar, but it really doesn't have to be. In fact, any RVer will tell you that the most enjoyable way to travel is at a slow pace. When you bring along a place to sleep and prepare meals, there really is no need to rush from destination to destination.

RV Myth #5: RVs must always stay in crowded RV parks.

Of all the RV myths, this one turns potential RVers off the most. We've all seen the photos of parking lot style RV parks where the rigs are lined up in tight rows and your picnic table is practically on top of the neighbor's sewer hose. Crowded RV parks do exist. In fact, there are a lot of them along highways and in more populated areas.

Truth: RVs have a wide variety of camping choices, including some options that are nothing like crowded RV parks.

Guess what? Just because you're traveling in an RV doesn't mean you have to park in a crowded RV park. There are an amazing variety of campgrounds out there that offer so much more.

State parks, national parks, national forests, <u>Army Corps of Engineers campgrounds</u>, and many countyrun parks are all great places to camp if you want a bit more nature and a bit less asphalt in your RVing experience. RVs can even camp off the grid.

The southwest is full of free land where RVs can spend weeks at a time camping in complete solitude.

RV parks have a purpose, but the idea that RVs are limited to this type of park is definitely a myth!

RV Myth #6: RVing is NOT the same as camping.

This one usually goes along with sentiments like, If you don't have a fire, cook outside, get dirty, sleep on the ground, or end the weekend smelling like a pile of old laundry, then you're not really camping.

Truth: Camping and RVing are as similar as they are different (in other words, it doesn't really matter).

There seems to be some scorn out there among "purist" campers who look down on those who travel in RVs. I guess there's something about sharing a campground with folks who brought along a comfy bed and a bathroom with running water that makes them grumpy (or maybe it's the lack of sleep caused by the cold ground they slept on).

The thing is that most RVers are rarely concerned about how they are living up to the title of "camper". People choose RVs for all different reasons. Some have physical limitations that rule out tent camping, some like the convenience of an RV, while others simply find it's easier to take the whole family on a trip in an RV versus a tent. None of these people set out to dilute the sentiment behind camping.

In fact, the dictionary defines camping as, "the activity of spending a vacation living in a camp, tent, or camper." There's nothing in there about having to rough it without running water, sleep on the cold ground, or cook your food on a stick over the fire.



In the end, whether eat your food off a stick or with a fork, sleep in a hammock or on a real mattress, watch TV in your RV (gasp!) or the stars at night, the act of setting up a temporary place to call home in nature is considered camping, plain and simple.


COACHMEN RV ROLLS OUT NEW FLOORPLAN FOR PURSUIT
